Fiscal Year 2022 Appropriations Bill At-A-Glance



Provides \$62.24 billion, an increase of more than 12 percent, to support the displaced and vulnerable, rebuild public health infrastructure, confront climate change, advance women's rights, and promote democracy

Supports the Displaced and Vulnerable

- Meets urgent humanitarian needs, many of which have been exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic:
 - \$4.682 billion for International Disaster Assistance administered by USAID
 - \$3.845 billion for Migration & Refugee Assistance (MRA) and U.S. Emergency Refugee & Migration Assistance Fund (ERMA) administered by the Department of State

Rebuilds Public Health Infrastructure

- Dramatically increases funding to confront the current COVID-19 pandemic, prevent future pandemics, and shore up gains made in global health:
 - o \$10.6 billion to support the health of families and communities around the world
 - Total includes \$1 billion for global health security to prevent future pandemics through both bilateral and multilateral mechanisms

Confronts Climate Change

- Expands global efforts to address environmental threats and reduce emissions with over \$3 billion to address the Climate Crisis and other environmental programs
- Includes the first direct appropriation for the Green Climate Fund, a \$1.6 billion investment

Advances Women's Rights

- Provides \$760 million for family planning and \$70 million for the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA)
- Repeals restrictions on safe and legal abortions by removing Helms amendment restrictions that have restricted access to safe abortion and health care services for poor women and by repealing the Global Gag Rule

Promotes Democracy

- Provides funding to support allies and partners of the United States, with \$1.6 billion to promote a free and open Indo-Pacific and help counter the growing influence of the People's Republic of China in developing countries
- Funds a \$2.517 billion effort to increase democracy programs and provides \$300 million for the National Endowment for Democracy (NED)
