Fiscal Year 2023 Appropriations Bill At-A-Glance



Provides \$56.3 billion, an increase of \$3.4 billion, to lower costs for working families, create good-paying jobs, invest in clean energy, and rebuild our water infrastructure.

Confronts the Climate Crisis while Creating Good-Paying Jobs

- Includes more than \$16 billion of transformative investments in clean energy and science, which will help develop and deploy clean, affordable, and secure American energy and create tens of thousands of green jobs in communities across the country:
 - \$4 billion for Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy, including \$370 million for the weatherization of over 40,000 low-income households
 - \$8 billion for the Office of Science to fund basic research in physics, biology, chemistry, and other science disciplines
 - \$550 million for ARPA-E to support high-potential, high-impact new energy technologies

Rebuilds Water Infrastructure

- Revives our water infrastructure and protects communities from more frequent and severe storms with \$8.89 billion for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to support project construction, operation, and maintenance
- Addresses the worsening drought and funds water resources projects with \$1.89 billion for the Bureau of Reclamation
- Promotes a robust economy by bolstering our port and waterway infrastructure including through the Harbor Maintenance Trust Fund

Strengthens our Nuclear Deterrent

- Enhances our national security by providing for a safe and secure nuclear deterrent while addressing the threat of nuclear proliferation and terrorism
- Protects our environment by funding legacy nuclear cleanup work through Environmental Management programs at \$7.88 billion

Lowers Costs and Supports Economic Development

- Helps lower energy costs impacting working families by strengthening America's energy independence
- Supports economic and community development, job training, and critical infrastructure with \$220 million for the Appalachian Regional Commission, \$38 million for the Northern Border Regional Commission, \$30.1 million for the Delta Regional Authority, \$15.1 million for the Denali Commission, \$33 million for the Southeast Crescent Regional Commission, and \$2.5 million for the Southwest Border Regional Commission
