Department of the Interior: \$13.79 billion



- National Park Service \$3.38 billion for operations, preservation, & funds for 500 new park staff, \$649 million above the President's budget request
 - Historic Preservation Fund \$122 million, including funds for State & Tribal Historic Preservation Offices, Save America's Treasures grants, civil rights site preservation grants, & grants to Historically Black Colleges & Universities
- U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service \$1.7 billion, \$342 million above the President's budget request

Environmental Protection Agency: \$9.53 billion

- Funding the EPA at \$3.3 billion above the President's budget request, including \$3.44 billion for EPA's core science and environmental program work
- State and Tribal Assistance Grants \$4.62 billion
 - Clean Water & Drinking Water State Revolving Funds \$3.08 billion
 - \$70 million in targeted grants for drinking water contaminants like lead & other hazards
- Superfund site cleanups \$1.21 billion

Land & Water Conservation Fund: \$524 million

• Including \$244 million for the federal program & \$280 million for state programs

National Endowment for the Arts & National Endowment for the Humanities

• \$167.5 million in funding for each agency, providing \$12.5 million above the 2019 enacted levels & rejecting the President's proposed elimination of both agencies.

Tribal Programs

- Indian Health Service \$6.3 billion for health services, recruitment & retention of health professionals, clinics & staff quarters, & investments in green infrastructure
- Bureau of Indian Affairs \$2.1 billion
- Bureau of Indian Education \$1.4 billion
