## A BILL

Making appropriations for the Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2020, and for other purposes.

1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3	That the following sums are appropriated, out of any
4	money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the
5	Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September
6	30, 2020, and for other purposes, namely:

8	LEGISLATIVE BRANCH
9	HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES
10	SALARIES AND EXPENSES
11	For salaries and expenses of the House of Represent-
12	atives, \$1,331,725,000, as follows:
13	House Leadership Offices
14	For salaries and expenses, as authorized by law,
15	\$28,428,000, including: Office of the Speaker,
16	\$7,964,000, including \$25,000 for official expenses of the
17	Speaker; Office of the Majority Floor Leader, \$2,955,000,
18	including \$10,000 for official expenses of the Majority
19	Leader; Office of the Minority Floor Leader, \$8,682,000,
20	including \$10,000 for official expenses of the Minority
21	Leader; Office of the Majority Whip, including the Chief
22	Deputy Majority Whip, \$2,456,000, including \$5,000 for
23	official expenses of the Majority Whip; Office of the Mi-
24	nority Whip, including the Chief Deputy Minority Whip,

 amount for salaries and expenses shall remain available
 from January 3, 2020 until January 2, 2021.

8 For Members' representational allowances, including
9 Members' clerk hire, official expenses, and official mail,
10 \$602,291,000.

# Allowance for Compensation of Interns in Member Offices

13 For the allowance established under section 120 of the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 2019 (2 14 15 U.S.C. 5322a) for the compensation of interns who serve 16 in the offices of Members of the House of Representatives, 17 \$11,025,000, to remain available through December 31, 18 2020: Provided, That notwithstanding section 120(b) of 19 such Act, an office of a Member of the House of Rep-20 resentatives may use not more than \$25,000 of the allow-21 ance available under this heading during calendar year 22 2020.

1 Allowance for Compensation of Interns in House

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#### LEADERSHIP OFFICES

3 For the allowance established under section 113 of 4 this Act for the compensation of interns who serve in House leadership offices, \$365,000, to remain available 5 through December 31, 2020: Provided, That of the 6 7 amount provided under this heading, \$200,000 shall be 8 available for the compensation of interns who serve in 9 House leadership offices of the majority, to be allocated 10 among such offices by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and \$165,000 shall be available for the com-11 12 pensation of interns who serve in House leadership offices 13 of the minority, to be allocated among such offices by the 14 Minority Floor Leader.

15 Committee Employees

16 STANDING COMMITTEES, SPECIAL AND SELECT

For salaries and expenses of standing committees, special and select, authorized by House resolutions, \$133,074,000: *Provided*, That such amount shall remain available for such salaries and expenses until December 31, 2020, except that \$2,850,000 of such amount shall remain available until expended for committee room upgrading.

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#### COMMITTEE ON APPROPRIATIONS

2 For salaries and expenses of the Committee on Ap-3 propriations, \$24,269,000, including studies and examina-4 tions of executive agencies and temporary personal serv-5 ices for such committee, to be expended in accordance with section 202(b) of the Legislative Reorganization Act of 6 7 1946 and to be available for reimbursement to agencies 8 for services performed: *Provided*, That such amount shall 9 remain available for such salaries and expenses until De-10 cember 31, 2020.

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#### SALARIES, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

12 For compensation and expenses of officers and employees, as authorized by law, \$243,730,000, including: 13 for salaries and expenses of the Office of the Clerk, includ-14 15 ing the positions of the Chaplain and the Historian, and including not more than \$25,000 for official representa-16 tion and reception expenses, of which not more than 17 18 \$20,000 is for the Family Room and not more than 19 \$2,000 is for the Office of the Chaplain, \$31,728,000, of which \$3,120,000 shall remain available until expended; 20 21 for salaries and expenses of the Office of the Sergeant at 22 Arms, including the position of Superintendent of Garages 23 and the Office of Emergency Management, and including 24 not more than \$3,000 for official representation and reception expenses, \$22,071,000, of which \$10,267,000 25

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shall remain available until expended; for salaries and ex-1 2 penses of the Office of the Chief Administrative Officer 3 including not more than \$3,000 for official representation 4 and reception expenses, \$162,802,000, of which 5 \$11,639,000 shall remain available until expended; for salaries and expenses of the Office of Diversity and Inclusion, 6 7 \$1,000,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office of the 8 Whistleblower Ombudsman, \$750,000; for salaries and ex-9 penses of the Office of the Inspector General, \$5,019,000; 10 for salaries and expenses of the Office of General Counsel, 11 \$1,518,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office of the 12 Parliamentarian, including the Parliamentarian, \$2,000 13 for preparing the Digest of Rules, and not more than \$1,000 for official representation and reception expenses, 14 15 \$2,088,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office of the Law Revision Counsel of the House, \$3,419,000; for sala-16 ries and expenses of the Office of the Legislative Counsel 17 of the House, \$11,937,000; for salaries and expenses of 18 19 the Office of Interparliamentary Affairs, \$814,000; for 20 other authorized employees, \$584,000.

21 Allowances and Expenses

For allowances and expenses as authorized by House resolution or law, \$288,543,000, including: supplies, mateatrials, administrative costs and Federal tort claims, \$526,000; official mail for committees, leadership offices, H:\XML\LBFULLCOMM.XML

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and administrative offices of the House, \$190,000; Gov-1 ernment contributions for health, retirement, Social Secu-2 3 rity, and other applicable employee benefits, 4 \$260,000,000, to remain available until March 31, 2021; 5 salaries and expenses for Business Continuity and Dis-6 aster Recovery, \$17,668,000, of which \$5,000,000 shall 7 remain available until expended; transition activities for 8 new members and staff, \$4,489,000, to remain available 9 until expended; Wounded Warrior Program, \$3,000,000, to remain available until expended; Office of Congressional 10 11 Ethics, \$1,670,000; and miscellaneous items including 12 purchase, exchange, maintenance, repair and operation of House motor vehicles, interparliamentary receptions, and 13 14 gratuities to heirs of deceased employees of the House, 15 \$1,000,000.

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#### **ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS**

17 REQUIRING AMOUNTS REMAINING IN MEMBERS' REP18 RESENTATIONAL ALLOWANCES TO BE USED FOR
19 DEFICIT REDUCTION OR TO REDUCE THE FEDERAL
20 DEBT

21 SEC. 110. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision 22 of law, any amounts appropriated under this Act for 23 "HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES—SALARIES AND 24 EXPENSES—MEMBERS' REPRESENTATIONAL ALLOW-25 ANCES" shall be available only for fiscal year 2020. Any

amount remaining after all payments are made under such
 allowances for fiscal year 2020 shall be deposited in the
 Treasury and used for deficit reduction (or, if there is no
 Federal budget deficit after all such payments have been
 made, for reducing the Federal debt, in such manner as
 the Secretary of the Treasury considers appropriate).

7 (b) The Committee on House Administration of the
8 House of Representatives shall have authority to prescribe
9 regulations to carry out this section.

(c) As used in this section, the term "Member of the
House of Representatives" means a Representative in, or
a Delegate or Resident Commissioner to, the Congress.

13 LIMITATION ON AMOUNT AVAILABLE TO LEASE VEHICLES

14 SEC. 111. None of the funds made available in this 15 Act may be used by the Chief Administrative Officer of 16 the House of Representatives to make any payments from 17 any Members' Representational Allowance for the leasing 18 of a vehicle, excluding mobile district offices, in an aggre-19 gate amount that exceeds \$1,000 for the vehicle in any 20 month.

21 ALLOWANCE FOR COMPENSATION OF INTERNS IN

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#### MEMBER OFFICES

SEC. 112. (a) Section 120(f) of the Legislative
Branch Appropriations Act, 2019 (2 U.S.C. 5322a(f)) is
amended by striking the period at the end and inserting

the following: ", and such sums as may be necessary for
 fiscal year 2020 and each succeeding fiscal year.".

3 (b) The amendment made by subsection (a) shall take
4 effect as if included in the enactment of section 120 of
5 the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 2019 (2
6 U.S.C. 5322a).

# 7 ALLOWANCE FOR COMPENSATION OF INTERNS IN HOUSE 8 LEADERSHIP OFFICES

9 SEC. 113. (a) There is established for the House of 10 Representatives an allowance which shall be available for 11 the compensation of interns who serve in House leadership 12 offices.

(b) Section 104(b) of the House of Representatives
Administrative Reform Technical Corrections Act (2
U.S.C. 5321(b)) shall apply with respect to an intern who
is compensated under the allowance under this section in
the same manner as such section applies with respect to
an intern who is compensated under the Members' Representational Allowance.

20 (c) In this section —

(1) the term "House leadership office" means,
with respect to a fiscal year, any office for which the
appropriation for salaries and expenses of the office
for the fiscal year is provided under the heading
"House Leadership Offices" in the Act making ap-

propriations for the Legislative Branch for the fiscal
 year; and

3 (2) term "intern", with respect to a House
4 leadership office, has the meaning given such term
5 with respect to a Member of the House of Rep6 resentatives in section 104(c)(2) of the House of
7 Representatives Administrative Reform Technical
8 Corrections Act (2 U.S.C. 5321(c)(2)).

9 (d) There are authorized to be appropriated to carry
10 out this section such sums as may be necessary for fiscal
11 year 2020 and each succeeding fiscal year.

12 CYBERSECURITY ASSISTANCE FOR HOUSE OF
 13 REPRESENTATIVES

14 SEC. 114. The head of any Federal entity that pro-15 vides assistance to the House of Representatives in the 16 House's efforts to deter, prevent, mitigate, or remediate cybersecurity risks to, and incidents involving, the infor-17 18 mation systems of the House shall take all necessary steps to ensure the constitutional integrity of the separate 19 20 branches of the government at all stages of providing the assistance, including applying minimization procedures to 21 22 limit the spread or sharing of privileged House and Member information. 23

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#### RESCISSIONS OF FUNDS

25 SEC. 115. (a) Of the unobligated balances available26 from prior appropriations Acts from the revolving fund es-

tablished under House Resolution 94, Ninety Eighth Con gress, agreed to February 8, 1983, as enacted into perma nent law by section 110 of the Congressional Operations
 Appropriations Act, 1984 (2 U.S.C. 4917), \$1,000,000 is
 hereby rescinded.

6 (b) Of the unobligated balances available from prior 7 appropriations Acts from the revolving fund established in 8 the item relating to "Stationery" under the heading 9 "House of Representatives, Contingent Expenses of the 10 House" in the first section of the Legislative Branch Ap-11 propriation Act, 1948 (2 U.S.C. 5534), \$4,000,000 is 12 hereby rescinded.

13 USE OF AVAILABLE BALANCES OF EXPIRED

#### APPROPRIATIONS

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#### (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

16 SEC. 116. (a) Subject to section 119 of the Legisla-17 tive Branch Appropriations Act, 2018 (2 U.S.C. 5511), 18 available balances of expired appropriations for the House 19 of Representatives shall be available to the House of Rep-20 resentatives—

(1) for the payment of a death gratuity which
is specifically appropriated by law and which is made
in connection with the death of an employee of the
House of Representatives, without regard to the fiscal year in which the payment is made; and

1	(2) for deposit into the account established
2	under section 109 of the Legislative Branch Appro-
3	priations Act, 1998 (2 U.S.C. 5508) for making
4	payments of the House of Representatives to the
5	Employees' Compensation Fund under section 8147
6	of title 5, United States Code, and for reimbursing
7	the Secretary of Labor for any amounts paid with
8	respect to unemployment compensation payments for
9	former employees of the House.
10	(b) This section shall apply with respect to funds ap-
11	propriated or otherwise made available in fiscal year 2020
12	and each succeeding fiscal year.
13	REDUCTION IN AMOUNT OF TUITION CHARGED FOR CHIL-
14	DREN OF EMPLOYEES OF HOUSE CHILD CARE CEN-
15	TER
16	SEC. 117. (a) Section 312(d) of the Legislative
17	Branch Appropriations Act, 1992 (2 U.S.C. 2062(d)) is
18	amended by adding at the end the following new para-
19	graph:
20	"(4) In the case of a child of an employee of
21	the center who is furnished care at the center, the
22	Chief Administrative Officer shall reduce the amount
23	of tuition otherwise charged with respect to such
24	child during a month by the greater of—
25	(A) "50 percent; or

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1	(B) "such percentage as may be necessary
2	to ensure that the total amount of tuition paid
3	by the employee with respect to all children of
4	the employee who are furnished care at the cen-
5	ter during the month does not exceed \$1,000.".
6	(b) The amendments made by this section shall apply
7	with respect to fiscal year 2020 and each succeeding fiscal
8	year.

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#### CAPITOL POLICE

#### SALARIES

3 For salaries of employees of the Capitol Police, in-4 cluding overtime, hazardous duty pay, and Government 5 contributions for health, retirement, social security, pro-6 fessional liability insurance, and other applicable employee 7 benefits, \$378,062,000, of which overtime shall not exceed 8 \$47,048,000 unless the Committees on Appropriations of 9 the House and Senate are notified, to be disbursed by the Chief of the Capitol Police or his designee. 10

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#### GENERAL EXPENSES

12 For necessary expenses of the Capitol Police, including motor vehicles, communications and other equipment, 13 14 security equipment and installation, uniforms, weapons, 15 supplies, materials, training, medical services, forensic 16 services, stenographic services, personal and professional 17 services, the employee assistance program, the awards pro-18 gram, postage, communication services, travel advances, 19 relocation of instructor and liaison personnel for the Fed-20 eral Law Enforcement Training Center, and not more 21 than \$5,000 to be expended on the certification of the 22 Chief of the Capitol Police in connection with official rep-23 resentation and reception expenses, \$85,279,000, to be 24 disbursed by the Chief of the Capitol Police or his designee: Provided, That, notwithstanding any other provi-25

sion of law, the cost of basic training for the Capitol Police 1 2 at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center for fis-3 cal year 2020 shall be paid by the Secretary of Homeland Security from funds available to the Department of Home-4 5 land Security. 6 Administrative Provision 7 SEC. 118. Section 908(c) of the Emergency Supple-8 mental Act, 2002 (2 U.S.C. 1926(c)), is amended by striking "\$40,000" and inserting "\$60,000". 9 10 OFFICE OF CONGRESSIONAL WORKPLACE 11 RIGHTS 12 SALARIES AND EXPENSES 13 For salaries and expenses necessary for the operation

14 of the Office of Congressional Workplace Rights, 15 \$6,333,000, of which \$1,000,000 shall remain available 16 until September 30, 2021, and of which not more than 17 \$1,000 may be expended on the certification of the Execu-18 tive Director in connection with official representation and 19 reception expenses.

- 21 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For salaries and expenses necessary for operation of
the Congressional Budget Office, including not more than
\$6,000 to be expended on the certification of the Director

1 of the Congressional Budget Office in connection with offi-

2 cial representation and reception expenses, \$52,666,000.

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#### SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For necessary expenses in carrying out the Technology Assessment Act of 1972 (Public Law 92–484; 2
U.S.C. 471 et. seq.), \$6,000,000, to remain available until
8 September 30, 2021.

#### ARCHITECT OF THE CAPITOL

#### 10 CAPITAL CONSTRUCTION AND OPERATIONS

11 For salaries for the Architect of the Capitol, and 12 other personal services, at rates of pay provided by law; 13 for all necessary expenses for surveys and studies, construction, operation, and general and administrative sup-14 15 port in connection with facilities and activities under the care of the Architect of the Capitol including the Botanic 16 17 Garden; electrical substations of the Capitol, Senate and House office buildings, and other facilities under the juris-18 diction of the Architect of the Capitol; including fur-19 20nishings and office equipment; including not more than 21 \$5,000 for official reception and representation expenses, 22 to be expended as the Architect of the Capitol may ap-23 prove; for purchase or exchange, maintenance, and oper-24 ation of a passenger motor vehicle, \$114,704,000.

CAPITOL BUILDING
 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
 and operation of the Capitol, \$45,912,000, of which
 \$18,599,000 shall remain available until September 30,
 2024.

CAPITOL GROUNDS

- 7 For all necessary expenses for care and improvement 8 of grounds surrounding the Capitol, the Senate and House 9 office buildings, and the Capitol Power Plant. \$19,336,000, of which \$7,600,000 shall remain available 10 until September 30, 2024. 11
- 12 HOUSE OFFICE BUILDINGS
- 13 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

14 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care 15 and operation of the House office buildings, \$153,273,000, of which \$30,300,000 shall remain avail-16 17 able until September 30, 2024, and of which \$62,000,000 18 shall remain available until expended for the restoration and renovation of the Cannon House Office Building: Pro-19 20 *vided*. That of the amount made available under this head-21 ing, \$8,000,000 shall be derived by transfer from the 22 House Office Building Fund established under section 23 176(d) of the Continuing Appropriations Act, 2017, as 24 added by section 101(3) of the Further Continuing Appro-

priation Act, 2017 (Public Law 114–254; 2 U.S.C. 2001
 note).

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#### CAPITOL POWER PLANT

4 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care 5 and operation of the Capitol Power Plant; lighting, heating, power (including the purchase of electrical energy) 6 7 and water and sewer services for the Capitol, Senate and 8 House office buildings, Library of Congress buildings, and 9 the grounds about the same, Botanic Garden, Senate ga-10 rage, and air conditioning refrigeration not supplied from plants in any of such buildings; heating the Government 11 12 Publishing Office and Washington City Post Office, and 13 heating and chilled water for air conditioning for the Supreme Court Building, the Union Station complex, the 14 15 Thurgood Marshall Federal Judiciary Building and the Folger Shakespeare Library, expenses for which shall be 16 advanced or reimbursed upon request of the Architect of 17 the Capitol and amounts so received shall be deposited 18 into the Treasury to the credit of this appropriation, 19 20 \$102,557,000, of which \$18,900,000 shall remain avail-21 able until September 30, 2024: Provided, That not more 22 than \$9,000,000 of the funds credited or to be reimbursed 23 to this appropriation as herein provided shall be available 24 for obligation during fiscal year 2020.

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LIBRARY BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

For all necessary expenses for the mechanical and
structural maintenance, care and operation of the Library
buildings and grounds, \$86,833,000, of which
\$57,500,000 shall remain available until September 30,
2024.

7 CAPITOL POLICE BUILDINGS, GROUNDS AND SECURITY

8 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care 9 and operation of buildings, grounds and security enhance-10 ments of the United States Capitol Police, wherever lo-11 cated, the Alternate Computing Facility, and Architect of 12 the Capitol security operations, \$52,840,000, of which 13 \$26,500,000 shall remain available until September 30, 14 2024.

15 BOTANIC GARDEN

16 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care 17 and operation of the Botanic Garden and the nurseries, 18 buildings, grounds, and collections; and purchase and ex-19 change, maintenance, repair, and operation of a passenger 20 motor vehicle; all under the direction of the Joint Com-21 mittee on the Library, \$15,822,000, of which \$4,000,000 shall remain available until September 30, 2024: Provided, 22 23 That, of the amount made available under this heading, 24 the Architect of the Capitol may obligate and expend such 25 sums as may be necessary for the maintenance, care and

operation of the National Garden established under sec tion 307E of the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act,
 1989 (2 U.S.C. 2146).

5 For all necessary expenses for the operation of the
6 Capitol Visitor Center, \$23,391,000.

7 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION
8 NO BONUSES FOR CONTRACTORS BEHIND SCHEDULE OR
9 OVER BUDGET

## OVER BUDGET

10 SEC. 119. (a) None of the funds made available in 11 this Act for the Architect of the Capitol may be used to 12 make incentive or award payments to contractors for work on contracts or programs for which the contractor is be-13 hind schedule or over budget, unless the Architect of the 14 15 Capitol, or agency-employed designee, determines that any such deviations are due to unforeseeable events, govern-16 ment-driven scope changes, or are not significant within 17 18 the overall scope of the project and/or program.

19 (b) This section shall apply with respect to fiscal year20 2020 and each succeeding fiscal year.

- 21 LIBRARY OF CONGRESS
- 22 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For all necessary expenses of the Library of Congress
not otherwise provided for, including development and
maintenance of the Library's catalogs; custody and custo-
