## HELPS WORKING FAMILIES WITH THE COST OF LIVING

- Includes transformative investments in education, including record funding for high-poverty schools and students with disabilities, with \$17.5 for Title I Grants and \$14.5 billion for Special Education
- Strong increases for programs that expand access to post-secondary education with increases for Career, Technical and Adult Education, Higher Education, and Student Financial Assistance, including a \$400 increase in the maximum Pell Grant
- Expands affordable early-learning programs with a record \$6.2 billion for the Child Care and Development Block Grant and \$11 billion for Head Start

## CREATES AMERICAN JOBS AND SUPPORTS AMERICAN WORKERS

- Invests in job training and apprenticeship programs with \$9.8 billion for the Employment and Training Administration, including \$235 million for Registered Apprenticeships
- Protects workers on the job with \$1.8 billion for Worker Protection Agencies

### MAKES HEALTH CARE MORE AFFORDABLE STRENGTHENS LIFESAVING BIOMEDICAL RESEARCH

 Accelerates the pace of scientific breakthroughs with \$45 billion for the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and \$1 billion to establish the Advanced Research Projects Agency for Health (ARPA-H)

#### **BOLSTERS PUBLIC HEALTH INFRASTRUCTURE**

 Provides a record \$8.5 billion for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) with a strong focus on helping states and local governments strengthen public health infrastructure and capacity

### ADDRESSES URGENT HEALTH CRISES

- Confronts pressing health crises, made worse by the pandemic, with:
  - o \$1 billion for maternal and child health
  - o \$2 billion for mental health
  - o \$3.9 billion for substance use treatment
- An increase of \$50 million for health disparities research
