House Republicans have written 2025 bills based on a sham funding <u>proposal</u> that <u>slashes critical domestic investments</u> and strips away education, job opportunities, housing, and food assistance that American families rely on.

House Republicans' Bills Leave \$60 Billion for American Families on the Table

- In March of 2024, House Republicans joined Democrats to increase nondefense discretionary (NDD) funding to \$778 billion almost \$6 billion over the <u>Johnson-Schumer terms</u> attached to the Fiscal Responsibility Act of 2023 (FRA).
- Consistent with the one percent for 2025 increase called for in the FRA, and in line with the
 laws enacted in March, NDD programs must grow by nothing less than one percent, for
 a total of \$786 billion in 2025. Even House Republicans' partisan bills could not follow
 through on their threat to stick to the statutory caps alone, but they still undercut
 American families by leaving at least \$60 billion in NDD resources on the table.

Increases for a Few Agencies Means More Cuts to Other Critical Services

- House Republicans are protecting only a few agencies across the government. Providing
 increases for the Department of Defense and the Department of Homeland Security
 means cuts are even steeper for other programs.
- After protecting just a few agencies, cuts to nondefense programs hurt hardworking people. Cutting programs that help keep our communities safe, provide nutrition assistance, housing assistance, and job training programs increases the cost of living and undermines the economic security of American families.

Table reflects Chairman Cole's July full committee funding proposals compared to FY 2024 enacted levels.

Small changes to Agriculture, Commerce, Justice, Science, Interior and Environment, and Labor, HHS, Education, and Military Construction, Veterans Affairs are consistent with the cuts in the Chair's initial proposal. Funding for Energy & Water is *cut* by 1 percent, but funding for defense programs *increases* by 3 percent while inflicting NDD programs for climate, infrastructure, innovation, and science with a 5 percent cut.
