Fiscal Year 2022 Appropriations Bill At-A-Glance



Provides **\$53.2 billion**, confronting the climate crisis while creating tens of thousands of good-paying jobs, and rebuilding water infrastructure

Confronts the Climate Crisis while Creating Good-Paying Jobs

- Includes more than \$14 billion of transformative investments in clean energy and science, which will help develop and deploy clean, affordable, and secure American energy, create tens of thousands of good-paying jobs, and address equity and environmental justice:
 - \$3.77 billion for Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy, including \$375 million to support weatherization of nearly 50,000 low-income households
 - Increases focus on deploying clean energy technologies in communities across the country
 - \$600 million for ARPA-E to support high-potential, high-impact new energy technologies
 - \$200 million to establish an Office of Clean Energy Demonstrations to accelerate the maturation of near and mid-term clean energy technologies and systems with the goal of faster commercial adoption
 - \$7.32 billion for the Office of Science to fund basic science research in physics, biology, chemistry, and other science disciplines
 - Directs the Department of Energy to increase efforts to advance equity and environmental justice across all programs and activities

Rebuilds Water Infrastructure

- Revives our nation's water infrastructure, which is critical to protecting communities from more frequent and severe storms, the efficient movement of goods, and addressing the worsening drought:
 - Includes \$8.66 billion for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to fund studies, construction projects, and operation and maintenance, including Harbor Maintenance Trust Fund projects
 - Provides \$1.95 billion for the Bureau of Reclamation to fund water resources projects, including \$191.4 million for drought response activities

Supports Economic Development

- Supports economic and community development, job training, and critical infrastructure with:
 - \$210 million for the Appalachian Regional Commission
 - \$32 million for the Northern Border Regional Commission
