Fiscal Year 2022 Appropriations Bill At-A-Glance



Provides **\$253.8 billion, a historic increase of 28 percent**, to create jobs, invest in education, child care, and research, bolster public health infrastructure, and advance equal treatment for women

Creates and Sustains Good-Paying Jobs

- Invests in job training and apprenticeship programs with \$11.6 billion for the Employment and Training Administration, including \$285 million for Registered Apprenticeships
- Protects workers on the job with \$2.1 billion for Worker Protection Agencies

Grows Opportunity Through Education

- Includes transformative investments in education, including record funding for high-poverty schools and students with disabilities, with \$36 billion for Title I Grants and \$17.2 billion for Special Education
- Strong increases for programs that expand access to post-secondary education with increases for Career, Technical and Adult Education, Higher Education, and Student Financial Assistance, including a \$400 increase in the maximum Pell Grant

Supports Middle Class and Working Families

- Expands affordable early-learning programs with a record \$7.4 billion for the Child Care and Development Block Grant and \$12.2 billion for Head Start

Strengthens Lifesaving Biomedical Research

- Accelerates the pace of scientific breakthroughs with \$49 billion for the National Institutes of Health (NIH), including \$3 billion to establish the Advanced Research Projects Agency for Health (ARPA-H)

Bolsters Public Health Infrastructure

- Provides a record \$10.6 billion for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) with a strong focus on helping states and local governments strengthen public health infrastructure and capacity

Addresses Urgent Health Crises

- Confronts pressing health crises, made worse by the pandemic, with:
 - \$1.2 billion for maternal and child health
 - \$3.16 billion for mental health
 - \$5.5 billion for substance use treatment
- More than \$400 million to address unacceptable persistent health disparities

Advances Equal Treatment for Women

- Increases funding to \$400 million for the range of health services, including family planning, covered by Title X
- Repeals the discriminatory Hyde Amendment
