Fiscal Year 2023 Appropriations Bill At-A-Glance



Provides **\$761.7 billion, an increase of \$33.2 billion**, to combat Russian aggression, protect national security, support servicemembers, uphold our values, confront the climate crisis, and address gender-based violence and extremism

Combats Russian Aggression

- Continues critical security assistance to Ukraine with an additional \$300 million for the Ukraine Security Assistance Initiative for training, equipment, weapons, supplies, and salaries
- Provides intelligence support to the Ukrainian military and national security forces
- Includes \$300 million for allies and partners facing Russian Aggression, including \$225 million for the Baltic Security Initiative

Protects National Security and Sustains Millions of Jobs

- Preserves our domestic advanced manufacturing base to support jobs and economic growth
- Enhances research and development with \$131.7 billion for Research, Development, Test and Evaluation (RDT&E)
- Defends democracy and counters China by advancing a free and open Indo-Pacific

Supports Servicemembers and Working Families

- Provides the full funding necessary to support a 4.6 percent military pay raise
- Supports working families by requiring contractors to pay a \$15 minimum wage
- Invests over \$300 million to construct and renovate public schools on military installations
- Provides nearly \$1 billion for sexual assault prevention, including \$479 million to implement the recommendations of the Independent Review Commission on Sexual Assault and Sexual Harassment, and \$193 million for suicide prevention
- Directs DoD to address extremist ideologies, including white supremacy

Responsibly Upholds American Values

- Includes a provision to close the detention facility at Guantanamo Bay at the end of this fiscal year
- Limits United States involvement in Yemen
- Repeals the 2001 and 2002 Authorizations for the Use of Military Force that have been used to justify involvement in wars in Afghanistan and Iraq

Confronts the Climate Crisis and Enhances Facility Resilience

- Invests \$2.5 billion in clean energy and climate adaptation to protect facilities, readiness, and global security
- Cleans up toxic sites globally with \$1.4 billion for Environmental Restoration activities
- Includes \$15 million to study health implications of PFOS/PFOA contamination in drinking water
- Provides \$1 billion to improve the Red Hill storage facility and to respond to the fuel spill
