Fiscal Year 2023 Appropriations Bill At-A-Glance



Provides **\$797.7 billion, an increase of \$69.262 billion**, to combat Russian aggression, protect national security, support servicemembers, address gender-based violence and extremism, and confront the climate crisis

Combats Russian Aggression

- Continues critical security assistance to Ukraine with an additional \$300 million for the Ukraine Security Assistance Initiative for training, equipment, weapons, supplies, and salaries
- Provides intelligence support to the Ukrainian military and national security forces
- Includes \$350 million for allies and partners facing Russian Aggression, including \$225 million for the Baltic Security Initiative

Protects National Security and Sustains Millions of Jobs

- Preserves our domestic advanced manufacturing base to support jobs and economic growth
- Enhances research and development with over \$136 billion for Research, Development, Test and Evaluation (RDT&E)
- Provides \$161.5 billion for procurement efforts, increasing funding for modernization to counter China and other near-peer adversaries which includes nearly \$32 billion to procure 11 Navy ships
- Defends democracy and counters China by advancing a free and open Indo-Pacific
- Provides \$42 million to implement DoD's Civilian Harm Mitigation and Response Action Plan, including measures to avoid, mitigate, and respond to civilian harm

Supports Servicemembers and Military Families

- Provides the full funding necessary to support a 4.6 percent military pay raise
- Goes above the President's budget request by \$1.2 billion for the basic allowance for housing and \$328 million for the basic allowance for subsistence to address rising prices
- Invests \$687 million to construct and renovate public schools on military installations
- Provides full funding for suicide prevention and sexual assault programs, including \$479 million to implement the recommendations of the Independent Review Commission on Sexual Assault and \$47 million for the Special Victims' Counsel programs
- Directs DoD to address extremist ideologies, including white supremacy

Confronts the Climate Crisis and Enhances Facility Resilience

- Invests more than \$2 billion in clean energy and climate adaptation to protect facilities, readiness, and global security
- Cleans up toxic sites globally with \$1.6 billion for Environmental Restoration activities
- Includes \$20 million to study health implications of PFOS/PFOA contamination in drinking water
- Provides \$1 billion to improve the Red Hill storage facility and to respond to the fuel spill
