SUMMARY OF REPUBLICAN FISCAL YEAR 2027 BILL

State, Foreign Operations, and Related Programs

The fiscal year 2027 State, Foreign Operations, and Related Programs (SFOPS) funding bill totals \$47.3 billion. The bill is \$2.7 billion, **a 6 percent cut**, below fiscal year 2026 and \$11.9 billion above President Trump's fiscal year 2027 request. It is \$12 billion below fiscal year 2025 – **and 20 percent cut from two years ago**.

This legislation:

- **Threatens national security by abdicating United States world leadership** at the United Nations (UN) and other multilateral and international financial institutions by not including any funding for the UN Regular budget, the UN Development Program, UN Women, and UNICEF.
- **Threatens women's health globally** by prohibiting the United States from contributing to the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), substantially underfunding bilateral family planning, and reinstating an expanded Global Gag Rule on non-governmental organizations that receive U.S. assistance.
- **Hampers the United States response to the climate crisis** by eliminating support for communities' ability to adapt to weather changes, sustainably manage their land and natural resources, and expand access to clean energy.
- **Limits America's soft power by walking away from capable and effective partners** targeted by DOGE such as the U.S. Institute of Peace, Inter-American Foundation, and United States African Development Foundation.

Bill Summary

Funds for Critical Agencies –

- \$9.8 billion to support the operation of our diplomatic presence overseas for the **Department of State's Diplomatic Programs**, an increase of \$403 million above the fiscal year 2026 enacted level and \$394 million above the fiscal year 2027 budget request.

- \$6.9 billion for **National Security Investment Programs (NSIP)**, which encompasses the activities previously funded under Development Assistance, Economic Support Fund, Assistance to Europe, Eurasia and Central Asia, Transition Initiatives and Complex Crises Fund. This compares to \$6.8 billion these accounts received in fiscal year 2026.
- \$5 billion for **International Humanitarian Assistance**, which encompasses the activities previously funded under International Disaster Assistance and Migration and Refugee Affairs. This is \$400 million less than fiscal year 2026 and \$1 billion above the fiscal year 2027 request.
- \$575 million for **International Communications Activities**, formerly known as the United States Agency for Global Media. This is \$77.7 million below the fiscal year 2026 enacted level and \$336.8 million above the fiscal year 2027 budget request.
- \$410.5 million for **Peace Corps**, the same as the fiscal year 2026 enacted level and \$20 million below the fiscal year 2027 budget request.
- \$830 million for the **Millennium Challenge Corporation**, the same as the fiscal year 2026 enacted level and \$221 million above the fiscal year 2027 budget request.
- \$1 billion for the **Development Finance Corporation's** administrative expenses and program accounts, an increase of \$11 million above the fiscal year 2026 enacted level and \$206 million above the fiscal year 2027 budget request.
- Includes no funding for the **U.S. Institute of Peace, Inter-American Foundation, and U.S. African Development Foundation.**

Global Health –

- \$8.9 billion in total for **global health programs**, a decrease of \$532 million below the fiscal year 2026 enacted level and \$3.8 billion above the fiscal year 2027 budget request.
- \$5.5 billion for **HIV/AIDS**, a decrease of \$350 million below the fiscal year 2026 enacted level.
 - This funding includes \$1.3 billion for the Global Fund.
- \$3.4 billion for programs to improve **maternal and child health and fight infectious diseases**, \$182 million below the fiscal year 2026 enacted level, putting women and children's health at risk.
- Prohibits support to the **World Health Organization and UNFPA.**
- Decreases funding for **bilateral family planning** to \$461 million, a decrease of \$114 million below the fiscal year 2026 enacted level.

Climate and Environment Initiatives –

- \$274 million, the same as the fiscal year 2026 enacted level for **Biodiversity.**

- \$89 million, the same as the fiscal year 2026 enacted level for **Wildlife Trafficking**.
- Prohibits funding to the **Clean Technology Fund and implementation of the Paris Agreement**.
- Prohibits funding for the **Green Climate Fund** or for any compensation to countries for loss and damages attributed to climate change.

Critical Country and Regional Programs –

- \$393.2 million, \$235.4 million above the fiscal year 2026 enacted level and the same as the fiscal year 2027 budget request for the **International Boundary and Water Commission**.
- \$500 million from the Foreign Military Financing Program to support loans and loan guarantees for **Taiwan**, \$200 million more than the fiscal year 2026 enacted level and \$400 million more than the fiscal year 2027 budget request.
- \$1.5 billion for a new fund, the **American First Opportunity Fund**, for Trump Administration priorities, \$650 million more than the fiscal year 2026 enacted level and \$3.5 billion less than the budget request.
- \$300 million for **Countering Russian Influence Fund**, the same as the fiscal year 2026 enacted level.
- \$400 million for the **Countering the People's Republic of China (PRC) Influence Fund**, the same as the fiscal year 2026 enacted level and \$155 million more than the fiscal year 2027 request.
- \$1.8 billion for the **Indo-Pacific** to counter the growing influence of the PRC in developing countries including \$175 million for Pacific Islands countries. This is the same as the fiscal year 2026 enacted level.
- \$3.3 billion for **Israel**, the same as the fiscal year 2026 enacted level and the fiscal year 2027 request.
- \$1.4 billion for **Egypt**, the same as the fiscal year 2026 enacted level, and removes the withholding of funds based on human rights and the rule of law.
- \$2.1 billion for **Jordan**, \$450 million over the fiscal year 2026 enacted level.

Other Priority Programs –

- \$647 million for **Educational and Cultural Exchanges**, \$20 million below the fiscal year 2026 enacted level and \$431 million above the fiscal year 2027 budget request.
- \$6.8 billion for **Foreign Military Financing (FMF)**, \$594 million more than the fiscal year 2026 enacted level and \$1.5 billion more than the fiscal year 2027 budget request.

- \$897 million for **International Financial Institutions**, \$634 million below the fiscal year 2026 enacted level and \$310 million below the fiscal year 2027 budget request.
- \$1.7 billion for **International Narcotics Control and Law Enforcement (INCLE)**, \$264 million more than the fiscal year 2026 enacted level and \$464 million more than the fiscal year 2027 budget request.
- \$310 million for **Contributions to International Organizations**, \$1.1 billion less than the fiscal year 2026 enacted level and \$18 million more than the fiscal year 2027 budget request. In addition to no funding for the UN Regular Budget, the bill also eliminates voluntary contributions to UNICEF, the UN Development Program (UNDP), UN Women, and the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (UN OCHA).

This legislation includes harmful policy riders that would, for example:

- Furthers the expanded Global Gag Rules to additionally restrict diversity, inclusion, and LGBTQI+ support.
- Undermine our democracy by allowing disinformation campaigns and extremist views to flourish.
- Prohibit funding for certain special envoys, advisors, or coordinators including the Special Envoy for Global Youth Issues, Special Envoy for Afghan Women and Girls, Special Envoy for the Human Rights of LGBTQI+ Persons, and the Chief Economist.
- Prohibit funding related to diversity, equity, and inclusion.
- Prohibit funds for organizations that provide services or affirm the existence of transgender youth.
- Prohibit funding for the Office of Palestinian Affairs.
- Prohibit refugee funds from supporting admittance or resettlement of Gazans in the United States.
- Prohibit assistance for Mexico until implementation of the water deliveries agreement begins.
- Restricts contributions to any international organization headed by the Chinese.
- Prohibit funding to implement the Arms Trade Treaty.
